**Location:** CBR Southeast Region Operations (South of the Ohio, East of the Mississippi)

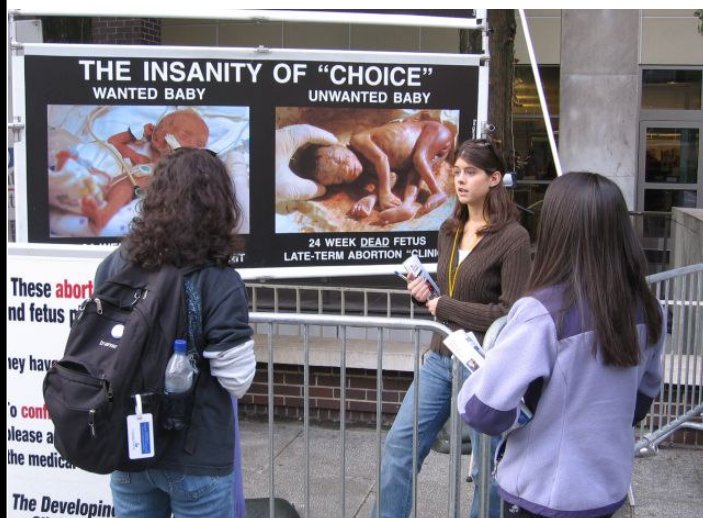
**Travel:** Some overnights

### Job Description:

1. Develop, maintain, and implement an annual fundraising plan for CBR Southeast.
2. Work with the Southeast Director to identify potential donor groups.
3. Develop and implement programs to maximize funding from each of the various donor groups.
4. Develop and maintain relationships with major donors.
5. Learn how CBR's strategy of using pictures to expose injustice is within the mainstream of historical social reform movements, such as the movements to eliminate slavery in the 1800s, expose and eliminate abusive child labor in the early 1900s, and correct racial injustice in the 1950s-1960s.
6. Coordinate fundraising activities with ongoing CBR projects, such as the Genocide Awareness Project (GAP) and the Reproductive "Choice" Campaign (RCC).
7. On occasion, participate in CBR projects. To understand and explain to others how effective these projects are, you have to see them for yourself.
8. Train and mentor new CBR staff members in conducting personal fund-raising.
9. Assist with other major projects, as needed.
